TERRAIN, PENNSYLVANIA

This September, Terrain took over the picturesque Waterloo Gardens property in Devon for its third shop. The six-acre site has a café, a restaurant, a private events venue, and stores, including Anthropologie. Planters with the brand's contemporary rustic look can be custom-designed. shopterrain.com

TULA, BROOKLYN

Tula started in 2016 as a mobile greenhouse, with cofounders Christian Summers and Ivan Martinez driving a converted truck around Brooklyn selling plants and pottery. This fall they're opening a flagship inside a former tool and die factory in the Greenpoint neighborhood. Tula is known for sourcing hard-to-find cacti, euphorbias, and other succulents. Most of the plants are pre-potted in a limited-edition collection of 100 ceramics created each season by local ceramists. The new brick-and-mortar will host workshops to encourage learning about maintenance before committing to a plant. tula.house
